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### Taking the Stress Away from Tests

The ACT test day; a day that makes students cringe and stomachs turn. Though most students dread this day because of the stress and pressure that have the tendency to come with it, however there are many ways to prepare for it. Since Whitehall District Schools' goal is achievement for each learner, the district offers ways for students to breathe easier on test day. There are two ways students can prepare for the ACT: the ACT prep course and the PLAN test.

All students in the junior class are eligible to enroll in the ACT prep class during the second trimester. While taking the course, students learn techniques and develop skills that enhance their ability to succeed on the ACT test. Senior Derek Bruckner, who took the ACT prep class last year said, "The ACT Prep course was beneficial in the writing portion. The class teaches you to use your time wisely." Junior Zach Balzer, who is currently enrolled in

the class said, "I'm hoping the course helps out a bit, but we haven't done a whole lot yet because of the new trimester. I've heard some good and some bad things about the prep course." The class is divided into three sections: Math, Science, and English Language Arts. Students rotate classes every four weeks to each section during the trimester.

Students can also prepare for the ACT by taking the PLAN test. The PLAN test is a required standardized test administered during the sophomore year for students. The PLAN test gives students a relative idea of what content will be on the test and how the ACT test is structured. Scores are a rough indicator of what students know or may learn between the time of the PLAN test and the ACT test. However, the PLAN test also gives the opportunity for freshmen students to test out of courses if they paid to take the PLAN test. Testing out of courses gives students the ability to schedule AP classes, which means that students can skip introductory classes when they attend college and earn college credits for the intro class.

Why is the ACT important? There are two significant reasons the ACT is important. The ACT is used as a standard for college admissions, primarily for schools in the area. Senior Timothy Rescigno, who has taken the ACT more than once said, "The first time I took the ACT I was a little intimidated, but after I realized it was just a test, my scores improved." Many scholarship opportunities are contingent upon ACT scores. Scoring high on the test could recipients financially in scholarship opportunities.

All juniors in the State of Michigan are required to take the ACT test administered on March 2nd. Many students believe only juniors are eligible to take the test. However, any student can take the ACT. Eligibility to partake in the ACT is not limited to grade level. In fact, students are encouraged to take the ACT at lower grade levels. The test consists of four portions: Math, Science, English Language Arts, and Reading. There is also an optional writing portion of the test. According to the official ACT website, the Math section tests knowledge in Elementary Algebra, Pre-Algebra, Intermediate Algebra, Coordinate Geometry, Plane Geometry, and Trigonometry. The Science portion tests interpretation of data representation, research summaries, and conflicting viewpoints. The English Language Arts section tests grammar usage and mechanics and rhetorical skills while the reading section tests reading comprehension over four passages: prose fiction, social science, humanities, and natural

### A Top Student And Now A Coca-Cola Scholar Semifinalist Whitehall Student Chosen for Next Level in Prestigious Scholarship Program

ATLANTA, December 3, 2010 - Rebecca Browand, a student at Whitehall High School, has been named a semifinalist for the 2011 Class of the Coca-Cola Scholars Program, With the 2011 class, the Coca-Cola Scholar's Foundation will have provided more than 4,700 young scholars nationwide with over \$44 million in scholarships.

"As a leading scholarship provider, we recognize our role in helping young people achieve their college goals," said Mark Davis, president of the foundation. "The economy continues to affect many students' ability to attend the college of their choice, so it is critical we continue to stay on course. The Coca-Cola Scholar's Foundation received nearly 71,000 applications this year, and the semifinalists are truly some of the most accomplished students in the country."

Browand ranks with approximately 2,100 high school seniors who are in the running for \$3 million in college scholarships that the Coca-Cola Scholars Foundation will award in spring 2011. Students are selected to advance to this next phase based on the academic excellence, leadership and achievement demonstrated in school and community activities. The Class of 2011 Coca-Cola Scholars will mark the 23rd consecutive year that the foundation has awarded scholarships.

As semifinalists, students must submit additional information that will be reviewed in January 2011 by a committee comprised of 30 educators from high schools and universities throughout the United States. If advanced, Browand will be among 250 finalists who will travel to Atlanta in April to attend the Coca-Cola Scholars Weekend. During their visit, finalists will attend a final interview process that will determine whether they are designated as either a National or Regional Scholar. The 50 National Scholars will each receive a \$20,000 scholarship award, while the 200 Regional Scholars will receive a \$10,000 scholarship. Two additional \$20,000 scholarships are awarded by the Coca-Cola Scholars Foundation, including the Coca-Cola Emory Scholarship and the Sandy Williams Alumni Legacy Scholarship.

The Coca-Cola Scholar's Foundation, a joint effort to Coca-Cola Bottlers across America and The Coca-Cola Company, is one of the largest corporate-sponsored, achievement-based scholarship programs of its kind in the United States. The program recognized a diverse group of extraordinary high school seniors who have demonstrated academic and civic excellence in their schools and communities.

The Coca-Cola Scholar's Foundation was created 25 years ago in 1986 to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Coca-Cola and to establish a legacy for the education of tomorrow's leaders through college scholarships.

### Creativity is Born

Genealogy is the study of genes. It is a small portion of the Biology curriculum here at Whitehall High School. Taught by Mrs. Autumn LeaTrea and Mr. Kurt Huizenga, sophomores learn the many facts of biology and the sciences involved with it. Projects are a great way to actively challenge young students' abilities. One of the many projects students are assigned throughout the course is called the "baby lab." Six years ago when Whitehall started the baby lab, it needed a name. After much consideration students and teachers decided on the "baby lab."

During the baby lab, students determine what the relative statistics are behind a child receiving certain genotypes from his or her parents. A genotype is a group of organisms which share genetic constitution. A series of coin flips decide what traits a child will receive. Accordingly, a partner sketches out the results. Upon completion of the simulation, each student will see a two dimensional view of their beautiful newborn. Huizenga said that his favorite part of the lab is allowing the students to be creative with the drawings of the kids.

The baby lab is a favorite amongst students at Whitehall High. Sophomore Marcus Moore said, "It's pretty cool how each DNA trait represents a specific part of us." Biology is one of Whitehall's courses where students are actively learning about themselves. Any class which incorporates an engaging learning opportunity contributes to the achievement of each learner.


