

### Getting Smarter with Smart Boards

At Whitehall High School, students finally have a new way to touch the world with their knowledge. Interactive white boards are now here. Teachers who use the interactive white boards in their classroom allow students to try the over-sized touch screens for themselves.

Back in May of 2010, the technology bond was passed, contributing around \$11 million toward upgrades in technology. High School Principal Dale McKenzie explained that the money was used to implement the latest in technology. Within the next several years, all Whitehall District School teachers will have access to interactive white boards and document cameras.

One teacher who talked about having the interactive white board in their classroom was Linda Welsh. Welsh teaches businesses courses at the high school. She was also a part of the district technology committee that tested two other brands of interactive white boards, along with the Smart Board which Whitehall uses.


"Smart Board," she said, "is just the brand name of interactive white boards." Smart Boards were favored by the testers, so they were purchased.

Welsh said that an interactive white board allows teachers to use a projected image at the front of the room. The interactive white board is actually hooked to the computer in the classroom, so it is essentially a computer on a screen. In addition, the Smart Boards are also a touch screen. The user can touch the interactive board to operate any software the computer uses.

Interactive white boards have both strengths and weaknesses. Welsh said that a major disadvantage to having the interactive white board is that sometimes it doesn't work how it should be working. "Sometimes I'll have to restart the program in the middle of a lesson," said Welsh. Of course, having to do that could waste class time. Another thing that came as a burden to Welsh was the new software was hard for her to learn. Another Whitehall teacher who uses an interactive white board is Mike Snell. He believes interactive white boards can be an inconvenience when the user forgets to move software programs back to the computer monitor to use.

Despite the inconveniences, interactive white boards have brought a new way of teaching to the classroom. Welsh really liked that it was easier to show her class what she does with the mouse in front of the room, and it keeps students interested. Another good thing about interactive white boards is that they came with document cameras. Welsh said, "They (document cameras) record papers and lessons, which are called Smart Presentations." Snell's favorite feature in the interactive white boards is the fact that the user can get graphics and manipulate them.



The movie says that in order to succeed the team needs to be one, and act as a family. This not only applies to the team in the movie, but to Whitehall basketball programs as well.

Both the girls' and the boys' basketball teams have created their own families by building and strengthening their relationships the more they play together. She added that one of the main differences between Fruitport and Whitehall was the love for basketball here.
