Excitement was in the air at the assembly held in the Whitehall High School gymnasium on the first day of school. Students need to be constantly reminding and checking each other so that I don't have to switch it back to the way things were. I don't want to have to do that."

Teacher Scott Hector said, "I think the vast majority of our students are responsible and behave respectfully. The policy opens us up to some serious repercussions if a member of the small minority abuses the privilege and does something they shouldn't. However, I believe that students here are respectful and if they are not our administration will address the issue swiftly and fairly."

Mr. Morningstar said, "I don't mind as long as it doesn't interfere with my class. Now the bells, I want those back! I am a creature of habit."

"I like it, because if I forget stuff I can tell my dad to bring it to me," said freshman Stephen Ogden.



Hard Work Concludes in Major Success

As Mrs. Deanna Cullen's sweet voice rang through Whitehall students' ears in her chemistry classroom, no one ever guessed her success was right around the corner. Cullen participated in a three-year program at the campus of Grand Valley State University, called Target Inquiry. The long hard work was well worth the amazing accomplishments from her scientific chemistry entry in The Journal of Chemical Education.

The purpose of the program was to advise chemistry teachers to incorporate inquiry learning into their classes. In the summer of 2008, eight West Michigan chemistry teachers began this program by starting a research project. Cullen's project was about antibacterial resistant bacteria. Not

too lona after, in the spring of 2009, Cullen presented her project at a regional American Chemical Society conference in Illinois, Each of the eight teachers in her division had two

research projects which were also published on the GVSU website. These projects and labs were used by teachers all over the world. They were given a package of instructions to run the projects. In August 2010, Cullen presented her periodic table at the Biennial Conference of Chemistry Education (BCCE) in Denton, Texas. Her division also presented their second project. For Cullen, her project was about Electrochemistry. Electrochemistry is a branch of chemistry which studies chemical reactions in a solution with conductors and the transfer between the electrolyte and electrode. She tested her 2009-2010 Advanced Placement chemistry class before and after they took her lab. She found her class progressed after taking the lab. The lab consisted of an electrochemist cell that the students could easily manipulate. The lab assisted students in their understanding of electrochemistry concepts by explaining what was happening at each level. Cullen wrote her article about her electrochemistry lab and it is published in The Journal of

Chemistry Education.

Principal of Whitehall High School, Mr. Dale McKenzie, said, "Wow! This is just simply amazing and it is so awesome that one of our own staff members did this. It shows just how knowledgeable she is! This is such a great personal record for Whitehall District Schools." This was one of the highest magnitudes of success a Whitehall staff member has ever had in Whitehall District Schools according to McKenzie. The Target Inquiry was extremely tough and intense for all of the teachers who participated in this program. Cullen found herself making many strong bonds both professionally and personally with the teachers she

worked with. She used what she learned from this program in her classes every day and was proud of the work she and the other teachers accomplished. She has learned to use her resources and everything else that was usable in her classroom and in her life from this process. "I have always enjoyed writing, so it was exciting for me to work on the article. Now that I have gone through the process, I am more likely to write another article," said Cullen. Cullen had to rewrite her article five times before even submitting it to the journal. Once the journal accepted her article, she had to go through four more rounds of rewriting her article until it could be published

into the journal. Also, she would like to thank her GVSU division for advising her through this journey and for editing her paper.

Cullen's three-year program was inspiring and successful. She persevered strenuously. She also plans on writing more articles about chemistry. Cullen, who has been teaching for 18 years at Whitehall District Schools, is a staff member Whitehall High School is very proud to have.
