Pay it forward - that was the reason recent National Football League draftee Ryan VanBergen came back to Whitehall High School to speak to the current student body. VanBergen, a 2007 WHS graduate, wanted to pay forward the inspiration he received from 2000 graduate Nate McLouth. Several years ago, VanBergen sat in WHS stands listening to then Major League Baseball player McLouth talk about his desire to make it to a MLB team. It was that speech that inspired VanBergen to go for his dream to make it to the NFL. That was one of the messages he sent to the current student body this May.

However, VanBergen also had a few other things to say. During VanBergen's speech, he mentioned that many people doubted him along the way, but he never gave up. VanBergen also spoke about four main elements which helped him achieve his goals: dedication, hard work, accountability, and perseverance. Another main point VanBergen emphasized was the importance of academics in school. He said, "Academics are twice as important as anything else in school." Coming from a potential NFL football player, those words sank into the minds and hearts of the Whitehall students who listened. Mr. Ken Jahn (teacher) concluded VanBergen's speech by saying, "The difference between an athlete, a good athlete, and a great athlete is this...," and a silence fell while he pointed to VanBergen's heart, making a very effective statement. "...Your heart." It has been all of the above characteristics that helped VanBergen become a stand out player at University of Michigan for the past five years. He currently is drafted for the North Carolina Panthers.

VanBergen took the opportunities that Whitehall offered to help form the person he has become. VanBergen said if he would have came from another school, he might have achieved the same amount of success, but his work ethic would have been entirely different than what it is now. Whitehall opened VanBergen's eyes to having a better character, which he said will always apply to life. VanBergen said he would most like to thank former teacher Mr. James Heeres for everything he taught him, and that he will carry that knowledge and wisdom with him. VanBergen also mentioned how he originally lived and attended school in Las Vegas, Nevada, but moved to Whitehall before his sophomore year. Because of this, VanBergen said that Whitehall gave him a sense of community and awareness that he would never have had if he would have continued attending school in Las Vegas. It was clear

- Sophomore Shaina Dagen said "Well, for my summer, I will be spending it mainly outside, going to the beach,





Goodrich was also happy to share this memorable event with his wife and children after the game. He has coached varsity for 13 years and was assisted by three coaches who were previous players at Whitehall; Sam Hatch, Holli Johnson, and Kristen Dagen.

The team was especially unified and focused on staying positive during games, practices, and training. "We're a family for three hours a day," said Goodrich. The team spent time outside of practices and games to scout other teams they would face later. He advised them to make notes of their weaknesses and vulnerabilities. Occasionally, Goodrich asked the team to think about what they could improve on and allowed them to make up their practice for the day based on their

conclusions. Before practices, they would have a session of sports psychology which was the basis of their team philosophy. In the past, previous teams went through struggles similar to all sports teams. Goodrich was pleased by how secure and mature the team has become. They have a personal acronym they used to stay focused: W.I.N. It stands for What's Important Now. Goodrich encouraged them to only allow 10 seconds to realize their mistake, and then move on to the next play. He felt that it was a critical asset to staying in the game. By doing this, there was always a good

atmosphere after the games even when defeat was amid.

Another achievement the team reached was earning the title off First Place Division Two Academic All-State. This was the first time Whitehall's varsity softball team acquired this title. The total grade point average for the team was 3.73. Goodrich emphasized the importance of grades and staying on top of their school work as well.
